

**UNO downs 'Dogs** 

## Mavericks score two goals in 24

seconds, women now 8-1 this season and ranked No. 14

The 55th minute doomed the Bulldogs.

Until 10 minutes into the second half of their game against the University of Nebraska-Omaha on Sunday, the women's soccer team managed to keep the game tied at 0-0. But

two quick goals in the 55th minute proved to be enough for UNO to sink the Bulldogs by a 2-0 score, handing Truman its first loss of the season.

On Thursday, the Bulldogs had claimed a 3-1 win against Missouri Southern State University to bring their win streak to eight games. Sunday's loss put an end to that streak as the Bulldogs fell to 8-1 this season. The eight-game win streak was the longest for Truman since 2004, when the team also won eight straight games.

The 2008 streak also was the longest to start off a season. After the loss to UNO, Truman - previously ranked No. 4 in the nation fell to No. 14 in the NSCAA rankings.

"It was a tough loss since it was the first one of our season," senior defender Kim Wolff said. "We always know [the UNO game] is going to be a tough game going into it. But we just didn't come out as hard as we usually do. It just seemed people weren't all on the exact same page. And

then with getting two goals within a minute of each other, just didn't really help us out at all."

This game marked a continuing lopsided rivalry between these two teams. Since 2003 Truman is 2-4 against UNO during the regular season, and UNO has beat Truman an additional three times in NCAA Tournament play during this time period.

As the 'Dogs began to tire in the second half, they were unable to keep the ball out of their half of the field, and on a cross, UNO forward Casey Bigsby knocked a header into the goal for

the first goal of the game. Unfortunately for the Bulldogs, the damage did not stop there.

On the ensuing kickoff, UNO took the ball down the middle of the field. After a brief battle with a Truman defender, UNO's Mykala Hanson scored the second goal off a give-in-go, just 24 seconds after the Mavericks' first goal. Truman was unable to recover as UNO goalie Lauren Fox made saves on all five of the 'Dogs' shots on

The score line does not tell the whole story about Truman's first loss of the season, though. The Bulldogs were evenly matched with UNO for the first half. Truman was tied with UNO through the first half

with four shots apiece. It was Truman's second half fatigue and the UNO's offensive explosion that doomed the Bulldogs. UNO shot 12 times in the second half, compared to Truman's five. For the game, the Mavericks outshot Truman 16-9.

This marked the first time this season that Truman was shut out and failed to score the first

Truman will be looking forward to avenging its loss when UNO comes to town Oct. 20.

"UNO is always a big rival, probably one of our biggest in the conference besides Central

#### Bulldogs utilize defense to beat FHSU

pass, followed his blocks and broke free to give the Bulldogs a touchdown just 21 seconds into the game. The 68-yard pass was the longest of senior quarterback

A torn ACL proved to be a blessing in disguise for the Bulldogs

Kim Wolff had the tools to be a Div. I soccer player. She had the speed a lot of schools look for. She was named a first-team All-Conference player and a St. Louis Post-Dispatch All-Metro player. It appeared that Wolff, a senior defender for the women's soccer team, would be set to go to a Div. I school.

Misfortune struck, though, when Wolff tore her ACL during her junior year of high school. She missed most of her club soccer season that summer, and the injury was a major deterrent against schools signing her.

"We got a bit fortunate being able to get her to come [to Truman]," head coach Mike Cannon said. "[With the injury] I think she fell off some bigger schools' radar.

# Football needs more success from ground attack

A poster hangs outside of the football offices in Pershing Building that outlines weekly goals for the Bulldogs. At the top of the list is the goal of gaining four or more yards on first down at least 54 percent of the

What follows are each week's percent achievement of that goal. The results read: 37 percent. **Blake Toppmeyer** 40 percent, 40 percent and 45 percent. For four straight weeks, the 'Dogs have not come closer than 9 percent of their

goal. And it all starts with the lack of a running game

In 60 first-down rushing attempts this season, Truman is averaging just 2.23 yards per carry and has gained four or more yards just 33 percent of the time

The Bulldogs' poor rushing numbers are not limited to first down attempts, either. After four weeks, Truman is

averaging just 2.2 yards per carry. The Bulldogs' run attack ranks last in the MIAA and 134th out of 148 Div. II football programs. Head coach Shannon Currier

said for his team to improve on the ground, it's going to take improved blocking to open up more holes for the running backs. "The bottom line is, we got to get

more movement up front," Currier said. "For any [running play] to be successful, you got to move their defensive line. We need to keep getting better to where we are creating more seams for our running backs.'

The Bulldogs have managed to go 2-2 after four games, but it's unlikely the 'Dogs can maintain success the next two weeks - when Truman

plays nationally-ranked University of Nebraska-Omaha and Pittsburg State University — without some semblance of a ground attack.

Statistically, rushing success is one of the most accurate indicators of a team's success. The 14 Div. II teams that rank behind Truman in rushing offense have a combined record of 12-54. On the flip side, the MIAA's top three rushing teams rank in the top four of overall conference standings.

Poor running teams tend to struggle in other offensive areas, such as third down conversions. Currier said short runs on first downs limit second downs to a passing-only situation and can lead to long third down plays. Plus, ineffective running teams are often unable to convert in short-yardage third-down situations. Truman is last in the MIAA this season with a third down conversion rate of 24.2 percent.

A poor ground game is nothing new for a Currier-led Bulldog offense. In his four-plus seasons in Kirksville, Currier has had just one team that averaged more than 3.5 yards per carry in a season. That was his 2006 team, which featured three senior offensive linemen.
