# Dobson radio returns

#### After several moves, the student-run station is back

Students were able to tune in to the first broadcast of the reopened 107.5 FM Dobson Radio on Sunday evening.

Dobson Radio is a self-funded, independent radio station run by students. Truman provides the room for the station to use, but the equipment is supplied by students. The signal is mostly contained on campus but can sometimes reach as far as Wal-Mart.

Senior radio manager Adrian Zimbelman said the station previously broadcast online, but had to stop because of user fees, restrictions and mandatory music documenting.

The 107.5 station originally was located in the Dobson residence hall before the renovations in 2009. Once renovations started it was re-located to a small room in Ryle Hall that had been the home of the Women's Resource Center. Ryle Hall renovations in fall 2009 moved the station again to a temporary location on the second floor of the building.

When broadcasts began last semester, the station ran into some problems. All the equipment had been moved to the new location, but the station's transmitter was not connected to the antenna. Without the connection, the broadcast range was limited to Ryle Hall residents.

Zimbelman said that when he became manager, he was not given very much information about the situation

"I didn't even know what room we were in at the beginning of the semester," Zimbelman said. "Basically, I had to start from scratch."

Zimbelman sought help from Information Technology Services on campus to fix the antenna problem. He thought the antenna might have to be moved closer to the room the station was in.

Jim McNabb, technical director of ITS, said his department was asked to help with the antenna relocation in October. He referred Zimbelman to the Physical Plant because ITS was not allowed to move the antenna due to the ongoing construction.

John Gardner, director of Residence Life, said he was the communication tool between the station, ITS and the Physical Plant.

"I've been trying to facilitate it just to get it to happen," Gardner said. "I've been trying to help out the radio station so they could participate in the activity."

Greg Brown said the antenna did not need to be moved. The Plant helped to run the necessary cabling over the roof and into the room through the window, but ITS connected it.

Brown said the Ryle Hall construction caused delays for the station. The antenna was taken down by the contractors during construction in that area, but recently was put back up.

"It took awhile, but finally everything came together." Brown said. "We did our part and whatever we could to help.

The antenna was finally connected during the second week of this semester. After fixing problems with their computer playlist, the station was able to broadcast.

Zimbelman said he is glad the station is up and running again, but the original obstacles were especially frustrating.

"We went two or three weeks with our DJs doing shows," Zimbelman said. "You could listen to yourself on the radio in the room we were broadcasting in, but when you went outside of Ryle anywhere, you couldn't get it. It was frustrating having DJs come in and not have their friends hear them."

Zimbelman wants the radio station to be open to anyone who wants to participate.

"We want to keep it that way to let average Joes who are just interested in playing music be able to have a place to do that," he said.

# Senate supports smoking ban

No more butts on campus. Cigarette butts, at least. If Student Senate has its way, smoking will no longer be allowed on campus as of Fall 2012.

Senate voted 10 to nine in support of a resolution against smoking on campus at its meeting Sunday night. Two senators abstained.

Senate supports the implementation of designated smoking areas beginning Fall 2010, as well as signs informing visitors, students, faculty and staff of the areas, according to the resolution. This would lead to an eventual campus-wide smoking ban in Fall 2012.

Senate tied seven to seven when voting on a resolution stating people must smoke 20 feet away from buildings in October 2009.

Sophomore Isaac Robinson, Senate vice president, wrote the resolution. He said Senate debated the issue for more than an hour at

its meeting Sunday. Robinson said the discussion among the senators was nerve-wracking.

"I'm glad that the Senate took action on it and decided to be pro-active on an issue and not be timid about it," he said.

Robinson told Senate that a smoking ban would save the University \$300,000 in health insurance because premiums would decrease with a smoke-free campus. He said this would save approximately four faculty positions or give a 1 percent raise to all faculty.

Senior senator Dan Heagney voted against the resolution, saying it disenfranchises smokers and international students.

"I recognize that it does impact some people, but on the flip side, stopping smoking, as bad as it is for someone's health, that's a right that they have, and I don't think we should be telling them when and where they should do it, especially when it's public property," he said.

Heagney said he was upset that Senate spent time discussing the possible savings because it was not in the resolution, and he

doesn't think DPS would be able to enforce a smoke-free campus.

Heagney said he hopes to get 300 signatures on a petition to have the issue placed on the Student Senate ballot in April. He said once students have a chance to make the direct decision, the issue finally will be resolved.

Judy Mullins, chair of the Benefits Committee, said her committee oversees benefits Truman employees receive. She said the committee recommended a non-smoking policy to Interim President Darrell Krueger.

"We are recommending non-smoking in whatever format works best for the University," she said. "We thought the people that had to enforce it needed to be involved, and we thought Physical Plant needed to take a look."

Krueger said he is in support of a

refocus on wellness," he said. "We are a green campus. Part of being green is to consider the costs of unhealthy living."

Krueger said that once constituency groups, including Staff Council and Faculty Senate, submit their recommendations, the president at the time could create a policy proposal that would then be submitted to the Board of Governors. The Board would then vote on the policy. Krueger said this would not happen while he is in office, and he is unsure whether the Board would support a ban.

"You have a right to smoke, and you have a right not to smell smoke," he said. "So two rights come opposed to each other."

Provost Troy Paino said he would be willing to listen to constituency groups about a smoking ban on campus.

"I want to do everything possible to promote a healthy lifestyle on campus, and if smoking cessation is the best way to get there, I would be supportive of that," he said. "But before I support that, I would also want to hear those who think it is possible to do all of those things but allow people the freedom to smoke in designated areas. I think that is a viewpoint that is out there that I want to hear."
