### SIFE team advances to nationals

Truman's Students in Free Enterprise organization was named a Regional Champion at the annual SIFE regional competition in Chicago, Ill. last Monday. Truman's SIFE team presented the projects they have been working on throughout the year and the impact of those projects on the community to a panel of judges. The team competed against five other schools and participated in a networking fair. They will advance to the national competition in Kansas City, Mo. during May.

### Ministry hosts charitable shoe drive

While a parking lot north of Baldwin Hall had been part of University planning since October 1993, the land needed for the lot's construction was not purchased until April 1995. The University spent \$487,555 to purchase the property. The lot was completed during the 1995 - 96 school year.

2004

Located at 104 E. Scott, D's Place was a popular lunch spot for University faculty and staff members prior to it shutting down April 23, 2004. "The people were so friendly and really seemed to care that you'd have a nice meal," said Allanna Preussner, associate professor of English. The space occupied by D's Place was replaced by Tutor's Deli during 1988.
