18 years ago

University president amid turmoil 1994

Following a Faculty Senate caucus that revealed 62 percent of faculty members lacked confidence in his ability to continue serving as University president, Russell Warren resigned. "That made it clear that I didn't think I could negotiate my way further through the changes that I wanted to make," Warren said. Warren's resignation came despite the Board of Governors requesting he stay. Jack Magruder replaced Warren, intending only to serve as an interim president. Magruder would serve until Barbara Dixon's appointment during 2003.

16 Years ago

City Manager protests rec center mission statement 1996

Scot Wrighton, Then-Kirkville city manager, expressed concern about the yet-to-be-constructed Student Recreation Center's mission statement. Wrighton's concern was related to what was perceived as an exclusion of Kirkville residents. The mission statement mentioned intended use of the center by the "University community." Wrighton argued that excluding use by city residents "doesn't help community-University relations." The mission statement was not changed.

Voters pass smoking ban ordinance 2007

By a margin of 677 votes, Kirkville voters passed a smoking ban ordinance that made restaurants and bars in the city smoke-free. "It's a long process," said Dr. Justin Puckett, who specializes in osteopathic medicine in Kirkville. "We've been working on this for almost a year now, and we have been involved at lost of different levels." Kirkville is one of 19 cities and municipalities in Missouri with a smoking ban ordinance affecting eateries and bars.
