Board of Regents endorses legislation to make University a liberal arts institution 1985

The then-Board of Regents, a precursor to the Board of Governors, endorsed Missouri House Bill 196, which proposed making the University a state wide liberal arts and sciences institution. The legislation passed both chambers of the Missouri legislature during Spring 1985 and then-Gov. John Ashcroft signed the bill into law. The University was the first state-wide liberal arts institution in Missouri. Prior to the change, the University had been recognized as a regional college.

20 Years ago

University cuts full-time photographer position 1992

Because of restructuring of the Advancement Office, the University cut the position of full-time photographer, instead hiring individual photographers and students. "I'm not bitter or anything," then-University photographer Ray Jagger said. "The way I look at it, the University is changing and they need to." The University hired current campus photographer Tim Barcus in 1995.

Wrighton leaves after nine years as City Manager 2003

Scot Wrighton announced his intention to resign as Kirkville City Manager after being offered an administrative position at the University of Georgia -Athens. After nine years as city manager, Wrighton left with the record for longest tenure in that office's history. Wrighton's new position in Georgia provided him the opportunity to advise local leaders from throughout the state seeking more knowledge about managing a local government. Wrighton has been city manager of Lavasa, India, since 2009.

Student Senate proposes creation of minority seat 1985

Student Senate approved a proposal to amend the Student Senate Constitution to create a new seat on Senate to be reserved for a minority student. Placed on the ballot during April elections, the amendment received more than 50 percent of student votes, but failed to receive the required two-thirds majority to pass.

Student Health Center fee is added to tuition 1996

The Board of Governors approved a recommendation made by then-University president Jack Magruder to integrate the Student Health Center fee into tuition. Prior to making the fee mandatory, students were given the option to pay the then-\$12 per semester charge. The decision to make the fee mandatory put \$120,000 directly into the Health Center's budget. It would also "give every student access to [the Health Center]," Budget Director Dave Rector said.

Students lobby state legislature for representation on Board of Governors 2003

The Student Association of Missouri and various members of Student Senate led students from several of Missouri's four-year public universities in an effort to develop support among state legislators for giving students a voting representative on their universities' boards of governors. Students from Truman State interning in Jefferson City assisted in drafting a bill to present before the Missouri House. Because of a lack of priority, the legislature was put off. The student representative to the Board of Governors remains a non-voting member.
