The Industrial Education Building renamed Barnett Hall
1982

The University renamed the Industrial Education Building, located across Franklin Street from Red Barn Park, after Ortho Barnett, who was the first head of the Division of Practical Arts. Barnett also served as the University's campus planner, overseeing the construction of Dobson and Missouri residence halls as well as the Student Union Building.

Pickler Memorial Library named a national research center
1989

Pickler Memorial Library became one of the select number of institutions in North America to be named a Pollard and Redgrave Research Center. This title was a result of the University's purchase of the complete "Pollard and Redgrave's Short-Title Catalogue," a collection of almost every book printed in the English language in the 15th-17th centuries — a total of more than 26,000 titles.

Violette Hall 1000 opens as University's largest classroom space
1999

Following a two year renovation to Violette Hall, the University was able to premiere room 1000. The amphitheater-style room accommodates 250 people, making it the largest classroom on campus. The room was meant to benefit student organizations and visiting speaker events. In addition to VH 1000, the renovations included a second-floor computer lab.
