Bill Clinton wins Adair County Democratic Caucus 1992

Then-Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton received 62 votes in Adair County during the Missouri Democratic Caucus. Although he was the winner, Clinton did not walk away with a majority of Adair County Democrats' votes, highlighting the intense primary race between him, former Massachusetts Sen. Paul Tsongas and California Gov. Jerry Brown. Clinton's victory in the Missouri Caucus added to the momentum that swept him into the front-runner position halfway through the primary season on his way to winning the Democratic Party's nomination and the White House.

Rock 'n Java opened on The Square to the delight of Truman State students and Kirksville residents. Not only did the coffeehouse promise to serve caffeine-addicts 24 hours a day, but it also included a performance stage, a ping-pong table and "unusual" foods. "I have a three-year lease, but this will be my business forever," owner Pam George said. The space used by Rock 'n Java eventually was utilized by the Washington Street Java Co. and the current Costan Rican Café, which opened during August 2011.

Hughes begins tenure as police chief 2003

Jim Hughes began his tenure as chief of the Kirksville Police Department. Hughes, who previously was deputy chief of police in Boulder, Colo., replaced David Pingel. "I think being visible, accessible and approachable are all important skills and traits that are needed to work on the relationships between the campus and ... the police department," Hughes told the Index in a profile conducted during his first week as chief. Hughes still is Kirksville's police chief.

Dixon appointed University President 2003

The Board of Governors chose Barbara Dixon to serve as the 14th university president. Dixon, who previously was provost and vice president for academic affairs at the State University of New York at Geneseo, replaced W. Jack Magruder. Dixon's tenure was marked by a comprehensive capital campaign, campus building projects and the stabilization of student enrollment. Dixon stepped down from her role as president during October 2009, following disagreement with the Board regarding the University's future. Upon her leaving, Dixon moved to Michigan.

Womens swim team captures sixth consecutive title 2006

The Truman State womens swim team claimed a national title for the sixth time in a row. The Bulldogs boasted the maximum 18 national qualifiers — seven more than second place Drury University. "Everyone just had great swims and got behind each other," then-sophomore Emily Greenwood said. "It was probably the most exciting meet I've swam in or watched." The womens swim team won their seventh national championship during 2008.
