### City Council supports construction of rental properties

City Council approved a resolution supporting the Preferred Family Healthcare, Incorporated housing construction project's application to the Missouri Housing Development Commission for Low-Income Housing Tax Credits. The project would help construct 25 new rental units at 1700 Osteopathy Street, providing safe, affordable housing for Kirksville families. An undecided number of units will be set aside for individuals with special needs.

The housing project is an investment for Kirksville that will provide employment through local contractors and suppliers, according to the signed resolution. The tax credits for which Preferred Family Healthcare currently is applying will help fund the construction of this housing project. The resolution was signed Monday at the City Council meeting.

### MAE program is introduced to Truman 1987

The University introduced the master of arts in education degree. The MAE replaced the bachelor of science in education degree, which was phased out by 1990. The MAE degree allowed students the opportunity to earn a bachelors degree in any field prior to entering the graduate program.

### University announces plan to build sidewalks on The Quad 1987

The University announced plans to construct sidewalks across The Quad following a formal request made to the administration by Student Senate. Official University policy urged students not to cut across The Quad prior to the decision. However, a student-worn path had formed during preceding years. "I think a sidewalk will save The Quad from being disfigured by more cowpaths," said D.C. Woodcox, part-time English professor.

### Students forced to pay cafeteria for history course 1995

Students in a Global and Current Events course meeting during dinner times in Ryle Hall Dining Hall were informed by the University the course cost did not cover the meal. This forced students paying for the course to either pay for a meal plan or pay for the meals individually. Taj Hargey, African history professor and the course instructor, said he had assumed students would not have to pay as it should be included in the course cost. As a result of the University and Sodexo refusing to work something else out, some students refused to attend the course meetings.

### Divisions and professors set up online home pages 1995

The University Computer Services assisted divisions in setting up web pages in an effort to establish awareness of the divisions to prospective students. Professors also were given the opportunity to create individual web pages.

### Military calls on students to serve 2003

Several students were called into active duty by the Missouri National Guard serving as military police for Operation Enduring Freedom in Iraq. ### Student Senate approves plan to provide national newspapers on campus 2003

At the end of the school year, students voted to continue the program indefinitely.
