Fraternity participates in local food bank program

Phi Kappa Tau members are participating in a statewide program that encourages hunters to donate deer to local food pantries. Fraternity members are working with Kirksville's Wal-Mart to load deer into a refrigerated truck that takes them to be processed at the Christian Community Food Depot in Kirksville. Gov. Jay Nixon and the Missouri Department of Conservation are also working with this project in an attempt to make the short deer season as beneficial as possible for Missouri. Fraternity members will be at the Wal-Mart drop-off area from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. and 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. on Sunday, as well as 6 to 8 p.m. Monday through Friday.

1993

The Department of Public Safety applied for a state commission that would grant DPS officers full police powers. Without the commission, DPS officers did not have the powers of arrest or pursuit. "The main reason we're supporting it is because we want to be able to provide the full range of law enforcement services when they're necessary on campus," said Mark Lee, then chief of Administrative Services. DPS was given the commission in 1994.

1997

The City of Kirksville announced plans to make significant changes to the city pool, including transformation into a family aquatic center with both indoor and outdoor pools to be paid for with \$500,000 the City had saved for repairing the pool. 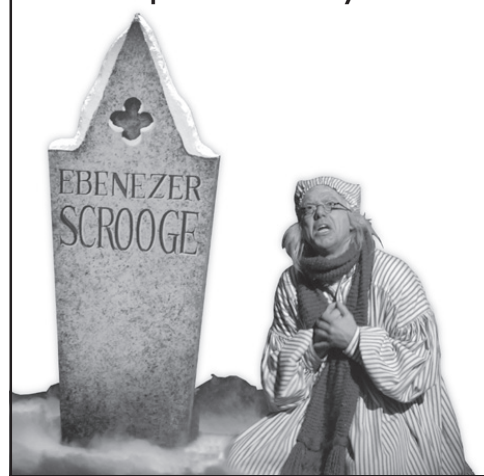
Missouri relaxes class requirements for MAE students
2004

The Missouri Department of Education changed elementary and secondary education teacher certification requirements. These changes included giving undergraduates seeking enrollment in the MAE program more options in selecting Liberal Studies Program classes. "We feel that it is important that students study broadly, that they are free to explore different kinds of disciplines," Education division head Sam Minner said. Prior to the changes, MAE students were limited in their selection of courses for the historical mode, scientific-life science mode and the Missouri Statute.
