## NEWS IN BRIEF

### Business school gets top honor

The School of Business has maintained their accreditation from the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business. Less than 5 percent of business schools worldwide receive the honor. Business departments must undergo an internal review every five years. "It takes a great deal of self-evaluation and determination to earn and maintain AACSB Accreditation," said Jerry Trapnell, vice president and chief accreditation officer of AACSB International in a Truman Today article. "Schools not only must meet specific standards of excellence, but their deans, faculty and staff must make a commitment to ongoing improvement to ensure continued delivery of high quality education to students."

### Nagan appointed director of the Office of Student Research

Maria Nagan, associate professor of chemistry, was chosen as the director of the Office of Student Research. Nagan has been teaching at Truman State since 2000 and received the Walker and Doris Allen Fellowship for Faculty Excellence Award in 2010. Nagan said she is interested in studying RNA molecules, which may lead to future HIV antiviral agents. Created in 2009, the OSR's mission is "to promote, facilitate, highlight and assess faculty-mentored student research at Truman across all disciplines."

### Scudder awarded for management in science department

Elaine Scudder, materials manager and purchaser in the School of Science and Mathematics was named Outstanding Scientific Materials Manager of the Year at the National Association of Scientific Materials Managers Convention in Minnesota this summer. The award was based on community service, professional contributions and letters of recommendation written by peers, NAOSMM members and materials vendors.

### Sheriff's Association names Munzlinger Senator of the Year

Missouri Sen. Brian Munzlinger, R-1, was named "Senator of the Year" at the 2011 Missouri Sheriffs' Association Annual Training Conference on Aug. 25. The conference honors one state senator and state representative each year for their efforts to support law enforcement. Munzlinger helped pass House Bill 294 to lower the conceal and carry age in Missouri to 21 and expand the use of conceal and carry permit fees.

## 40 years ago

**Centennial cafeteria opens to provide meals for 680**  
1971

A lack of financing prevented the Centennial Dining Hall from opening with the residence hall in 1968. When it opened, the dining hall became the first to offer meals to female students living in the building exclusively — Centennial Hall was at the time a girls-only residence hall.

**NMSC freshmen arrive, dance, roast pig**  
1971

A pig roast picnic kicked off day long festivities meant to welcome freshmen to the University in the newly renovated Red Barn Park. Following the picnic, an assembly in Baldwin Auditorium showcased the talents of the NMSC Jazz Band before a freshman dance in the Student Union Building concluded the day's events.

1981
