### Microsoft Word issues resolved

Information Technology Services resolved issues occurring with Microsoft Word. Technical Director Jim McNabb said an error was reported in late August that Microsoft Word documents could not be opened when accessed from Blackboard. ITS sent out a temporary solution to students and faculty Aug. 25, which allowed documents to be saved. The issue was resolved this past weekend allowing for documents to be opened and saved when accessed from Blackboard.

# Years gone by: check out what made headlines in Kirksville during this week in years past.

## 35 years ago

**Water plant for 50,000 citizens unveiled**  
1961

Then Gov. Kit Bond dedicated the newly constructed Kirksville water treatment plant. The facility cost \$7.5 million to build and was intended to accommodate as many as 50,000 people.

## 25 years ago

**Index theft reported**  
1986

Almost 3,000 copies of the Index disappeared from news bins on campus immediately after being distributed. The University classified the incident as a theft.

## 15 Years ago

**Two professors suspended for sexual assault allegations**  
1996

Two professors were under investigation by law enforcement and suspended from their jobs at the University after a student filed sexual assault charges against the men. In response, one of the professors accused the student in a formal complaint to the University of trying to use sex to influence a grade.

The drama dragged throughout the fall semester, but eventually the student's charges against the professors were dropped by the prosecutor and both professors reached settlements with the University that resulted in their resignation.

## 5 years ago

**Four involved in drive-by shooting**  
2006

Early Labor Day morning, Kirksville Police officers responded to a reported drive-by shooting on N. Marion Street. Four people were arrested in relation to the incident, in addition to other weapons-related charges. No injuries were reported.

**E. coli outbreak reaches Kirksville**  
2006

As the E. coli bacteria spread across the United States as a result of tainted produce, at least four Kirksville residents were reported as being infected during September. As a result, Sodexo removed spinach from campus dining halls until the national outbreak had subsided.
