## STUDENT SENATE IN BRIEF

• Senate president Ryan Nely appointed an Athletic Fee Accountability Committee comprised of ten members. Nely was appointed as President of the Student Association. ## 40 years ago

**Red Barn Park created**  
1971

## 30 years ago

**Students steal from Burt Reynolds**  
1981

Approximately 25 students illegally used a telephone credit card number owned by actor Burt Reynolds for the purpose of making long-distance calls, prompting an investigation by law enforcement and the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

## 25 Years ago

**Vincent Price named University National Fundraising Chairman**  
1986

Actor Vincent Price was named University National Fundraising Chairman during his eighth visit to the Truman as part of the Lyceum series. The title — considered primarily honorary — was bestowed following Price's work in promoting the University around the nation, as well as his personal \$1,000 donation to the University's art scholarship fund.

## 20 years ago

**University introduces coed housing and the Internet**  
1991

During the same September week, the University Board of Directors approved a policy allowing coed housing on campus, and the Internet was made accessible for the first time to University students through on-campus computers.
