Student Affairs Office accepting Who's Who applications

The Dean of Student Affairs Office is accepting applications from seniors eligible to graduate during the 2011-2012 academic school year for the "Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges" awards. Applicants must have an overall GPA of at least 2.75 and have community and campus leadership experience. Recipients of the award will be announced at the end of the Fall 2011 semester. Students either can submit completed applications and a letter of recommendation by Oct. 1 to the Student Affairs Office or through its website.

Federal program funding overseas language studies

Students attending language institutes overseas during summer 2012 can apply for full funding through the Critical Language Scholarship Program. Undergraduate, graduate and masters students from all fields of study are welcome to apply by Nov. 15 at clscholarship.org. Recipients are selected by the Council of American Overseas Research Centers and approved by U.S. Department of State, Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs. CLS aims to increase the number of students studying "critical need languages."

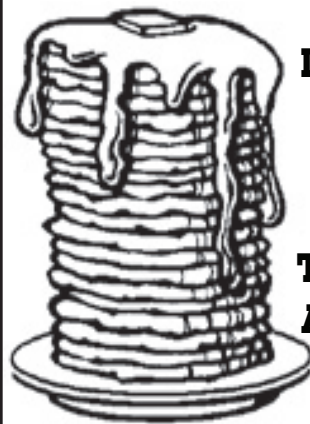
