Track travels to Jim Duncan

It was competitive weekend for the men's and women's track and field teams, who left the Jim Duncan Invitational with a total of three first-place finishes and many individual improvements of season and career best

The Invitational was at Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa, and both teams had much to look forward to going into the meet due to the tough competition and good facilities. Div. I and Div. II schools comprised the competition for the weekend.

"When you have good facilities and good competition, you're bound to do better," junior Becca Nelson said.

Nelson was among the winners of the weekend with a first place finish in the long jump. With a mark of 17-06.25 she continued her success Saturday morning with a fourth place finish in the javelin and seventh place finish in the 100-meter hurdles, scoring a personal best time of 14.71.

"It's getting closer to conference where everyone is wanting to peak," Nelson said. "So I

think people are expecting and wanting more." Other notable finishes from the women came from the 3,000-meter run led by junior Katie Hirsch. She placed eighth with a time of 11:46.40, beating freshman Emma Burditt by more than two seconds after she finished with a time of 11:48.66. Junior Abby Palm placed 11th with a time of 12:08.98. Seniors Karen and Cindy Grauel were also successful, placing sixth and 11th in the 5,000-meter run, with times of 17:42.61 and 18:03.79 respectively.

More improved season and personal marks came from sophomore Nora Kueny in the 400-meter, freshman Lauren Westen in the 800-meter and freshman Beth Keene in the triple jump.

The men proved to be equally competitive with two event wins, an NCAA provisional mark and more improved individual times.

Junior Matt Schaefer started the weekend scoring an NCAA provisional mark in the 800-meter run. Schaefer was able to set a personal best time of 1:52.19 and won the second heat of the 800. He came together with sophomore Zach Thomas, sophomore Dominic Kacich and senior Ryan Peterson for a fourth place finish for the 4x400 relay.

A third place finish in the 400-meter and a sixth place finish in the 200-meter were just the start for Peterson, a member of the winning 4x100 relay which included freshmen Nick Anderson and Jared Boyd and sophomore B.J. Smith.

A focus on details during practice was a big difference in the 4x100 relay team from last weekend to this weekend, Boyd said.

"Our handoffs went well in practice which translated to the meet," he said.

Senior Matthew Smith also placed high with a fourth place finish in shot put. Junior Andrew Sheets scored a personal best, breaking ten minutes in the steeple chase for a fifth place spot while sophomore Brad Hart se-

cured a personal best in the 5,000-meter run, beating teammate junior Alex Volstromer by just two spots.
