#### Airport construction begins

New construction will begin at Kirksville Regional Airport that will include new lighting and road repaving. Kirksville City Engineer Ed Jeans said Kirksville City Council agreed to a contract with W.L. Miller for the construction. He said the company will begin work during April and will begin other construction projects for a new parking lot during the fall.

Jeans said the airport has a funding agreement with the Missouri Department of Transportation to install lights that will be on the entrance road of the airport. He said City Council had been planning to make the improvements for a year. It should not impact flight schedules.

#### Missouri Department of Transportation implements new program

"On the Move," a program being implemented by the Missouri Department of Transportation, allows drivers to share ideas for highway improvements. Amy Crawford, MoDOT North Area Engineer, said the ideas will be used when MoDOT updates a the long-term transportation plan. She said MoDOT will have a listening session at Truman on April 3 where attendees can make suggestions for the improvement project.

## 6 years ago

### Severe snow storm forces students to stay on campus 2007

A snow storm that ABC News reported killed 15 people throughout the Midwest forced some students to stay on campus during the spring midterm break. Students who did not leave during the break had to pay a \$15 fee. Residence Life said some students were unaware of the fee, although it had been a part of the housing contract.

## 17 years ago

### Plans made to open Student Recreation Center 1996

The Truman State Board of Governors made plans for the Student Recreation Center project. Some of the Board members said the new complex might compete for business with other exercise facilities in the area, such as the YMCA. Because of the competition and because the project was not publicly funded, the Board said only people affiliated with the University would be allowed to use the facility.

## 42 years ago

### New cafeteria opens in Centennial Hall 1971

Residence Life opened the first residence hall cafeteria in Centennial Hall. The cafeteria had a capacity of 680 people and served only female residents. Centennial Hall staff said the cafeteria would be open to the general public during Sundays. Male residents continued to eat in the Georgian Rooms.
