Honors Society receives honors designation

Truman State's chapter of honors society Phi Kappa Phi has been designated by its national assembly as a Chapter of Merit for the 2012 academic year. The award recognizes the chapter for actively demonstrating the society's core principles of recognizing and promoting academic excellence for all fields of higher education, and engaging the community of scholars with service to others. The award specifically recognizes the chapter for meeting frequently, having annual initiations and for applying for Phi Kappa Phi's national scholarships, grants and fellowships.

As part to the Chapter of Merit award, Truman's chapter received a commendation letter from the society, special recognition by the society's website and publications, a specially designed logo for use for chapter communications, recognition by local media and educational journals and a \$100 award.

Applications open for Fulbright teaching fellowship

Applications are now available for a Fulbright teaching fellowship to Greece beginning Sept. 1 and ending July 15 of the following calendar year. Applicants must be graduating seniors or recent graduates with a record of academic excellence. Education and English literature majors are preferred but other majors are accepted.

Fellows will act as young ambassadors for the United States and will receive a monthly stipend and health care package during the fellowship. Housing will be provided at the school's campus in a suburb of Athens. There are 12 fellowships annually awarded. University lawyer Ray Klingensmith drafted a proposal of a new ethics policy for the University in response to a new state law requiring public universities to have a code of ethics for employees by Dec. 31 of that year. The new policy faced controversy due to a section prohibiting university employees from renting property to students. Several employees feared losing large amounts of money if the policy passed.

About 150 Chinese students and supporters paraded around campus protesting the United Nations announcement that Nationalist China was ousted from the organization and that Communist China would be officially recognized by the UN. The protest was because of student fear about the spread of communism.
