### Campus to host bone marrow donor drive

A bone marrow donor drive sponsored by the President's Committee for Campus Well Being will be from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Dec. 5 in the Student Union Building Alumni Room. The purpose of the drive is to increase the donor pool among volunteer ages 18 to 44. No actual bone marrow donations will be conducted during the drive.

### 11 years ago

#### University participates in nation-wide "Great American Smoke-Out" 2001

As part of the American Cancer Society's annual "Great American Smoke-out" students and faculty received a free Blimpie cold turkey sandwich from the SUB in exchange for 10 or more cigarettes. The University participated to raise awareness about the harmful effects of smoking. Channel two was made available for on campus residents as a film and Northeast Missouri news channel. The channel ran programming from 5 to 11 p.m. Then "Residential Living" spent \$7,000 for the necessary equipment to broadcast the channel throughout the campus. Eventually the University planned to broadcast campus programs on the channel as well.

### 31 years ago

#### University conducts second test for new online registration system 1981

The University conducted a second trial of online registration for 1,000 students. Previously only 250 students had tested the program and a larger sample size was needed to ensure that the system functioned properly. The system was adopted to make the registration process faster and decrease the amount of time advisors needed to spend at the Registrars Office. The University planned to officially implement the system during the spring 1982 semester.
