 how important he considers the economy, the agriculture community and the disabled community as well. He said he hopes to be able to advocate for the issues that are important to northern Missouri.

Walker spoke to local Republicans during his victory speech with about 50 people that attended the watch party

at Steve's Garden Deli. Walker thanked his two sons, Sam and Madison Walker, who came to visit him from Jefferson City, Mo., and New York respectively, to be with their dad during Election Day.

"I wish my opponent, Mrs. McClanahan and her husband Marvin, the very best," Walker said. "She had a lot of tenacity. She was a tough opponent to

run against and she was very tough out there."

McClanahan said she's not certain what's next in line for her future, but that she looks forward to taking some time for her family and herself.

"I'm currently the president of the Missouri Nurses Association," McClanahan said. "That's something I can refocus on, and that, of course, is something

that's a huge part of me." She said she's already had several people suggesting different options she could pursue next.

McClanahan said when the campaign started she knew what the odds were, but after looking at the numbers Wednesday, she realized that the campaign did significantly better than they initially thought.

"I feel especially good about

that considering how significantly we were outspent," McClanahan said.

Looking back, McClanahan said she feels a sense of accomplishment. She said it was important to be on the ballot, and to take a stance regarding the issues that matter to a lot of voters.

"I really, truly have no regrets," she said.

 "I was very impressed that they were willing to volunteer when it was not within the scope of their responsibility," Esperanza said.

Junior Blake Hernton, West Campus student advisor, said he had just finished midnight rounds and arrived back in his room when the fire alarms went off. He said he made sure residents out in the halls left the building, and he went to his post. Hernton said residents appropriately responded during the emergency situation.

"They all did a great job," Hernton said. "They all responded quickly and didn't freak out. They didn't complain. Well, they might have complained about the cold, but what can you do?"

Freshman Isaac Pearlstone, third floor resident, said he was in his room when the alarms went off. While he said the fire took him by surprise, it has not affected him. He said the biggest problem now is the smell of smoke on the third floor.

Due to the fire, Esperanza said she wants to remind West Campus residents to be careful while cooking.

"Cook safely," Esperanza said. "Make sure you don't leave food unattended. If you are cooking with grease, don't add water."
