### National, deadly meningitis outbreak is not a concern for Truman State

The steroid which caused 15 deaths across the country, according to the Center for Disease Control, is not a concern for Truman State or the Kirksville area, Brenda Higgins, Student Health Center director, said.

The CDC has reported the contaminated steroid has been linked to fungal meningitis, which has infected 198 people across 13 states, not including Missouri. The manufacturer of the contaminated steroid is the New England Compounding Center from Framingham, Mass.

Higgins said none of the contaminated product was shipped to Missouri and none of the Health Center's stock comes from a compounding pharmacy.

### 11 years ago

#### Nazi propoganda found throughout campus 2001

Slips of paper showing swastikas, racist slogans and a web address for a neo-Nazi website were found in several buildings throughout campus. The papers were linked to Gary Lauck, an American neo-Nazi leader whose organization was considered by the German government to be the largest supplier of Nazi propoganda for the underground socialist movement. The papers, found in McClain and Baldwin halls, were collected by DPS. No students were implicated in the investigation.

### 37 Years ago

#### Coalition formed to address racial discrimination in Homecoming queen race 1980

The Association of Black Collegians formed a coalition protesting the results of the screening process of homecoming queen candidates. The students said racial discrimination was involved in the process and that the African American student population was underrepresented in the results of the screening. A petition was circulated encouraging students to protest the contest.
