Ophelia Parrish receives new roof

2006

The Board of Governors approved \$1 million to replace roofing tiles on Ophelia Parrish. This was the third set of major repairs done in less than five years on the building. The roof was repaired because of problems with sounds from outside the building coming into the performance hall and disrupting shows. The new roof was intended to improve the acoustics of the performance hall and allow professors to better instruct students without interfering noises.

Air filter manufacturing factory closes Kirksville plant

1984

Donaldson Company Inc. permanently closed its Kirksville plant as part of a world-wide consolidation effort by the company. The plant employed 96 Kirksville residents and was one of the best paying jobs in the area. The plant also regularly employed students from the University as management interns.

Board of Regents approves new scholarship program

1974

The Junior College Scholarship Program was approved by the Board of Regents to encourage academic excellence at the University and to recognize superior Missouri junior college scholars and citizens. Each department, except nursing, military science and library museums, was allowed to give its own scholarship to incoming students from junior colleges. Scholarships were \$1,176 to cover room and board fees.
