University President is commemorated after summer death 1937

Students and staff remembered University President Eugene Fair after he died of a cerebral hemorrhage in St. Louis, Mo. during the summer. Fair had been president of the University for 12 years and taught at the University for 16 years prior to his appointment. Dr. Walter H. Ryle succeeded Fair as University President.

A shortage of state money caused the state to drop coverage of liability insurance, causing the University to begin covering faculty and staff. The University accepted a bid for \$20,296 from Fred S. James and Company for a policy that was good for one year.

Emergency landing brings soup heir to Kirkville 2008

Bennett Dorrance, the heir to the Campbell Soup Company fortune, was forced to make an emergency landing at the Kirkville Regional Airport. The plane, in route to Pittsburgh, Pa., landed in Kirkville after the pilot noted fire on the windshield and smoke in the cockpit. After five hours the plane was deemed safe to fly and departed for northeast Wisconsin.
