The Truman State University Foundation will open applications for scholarships not yet awarded Oct. 1. Applications will be due by midnight Nov. 1 and can be found online at <https://secure.truman.edu/isupport-s/>.

The Foundation awarded \$538,243 during the 2011-2012 academic year. Of the money awarded, \$331,092 went to first-time, upperclassmen recipients and the remaining amount was awarded to incoming freshman and as scholarship renewals.

Applications for scholarships for the 2013-2014 academic year will be available during February. Foundation scholarships are possible thanks to donations from alumni and friends of the University.

Missouri Government Internship program hosts informational meeting

Students interested in Truman's Missouri Government Internship program can attend an informational meeting from 5:30-7 p.m., Oct. 3 in the Student Union Building Alumni Room.

The internship will be at the Capitol in Jefferson City, Mo. and offers students an inside look at state government during the Spring 2013 semester. Intern duties include attending meetings, making reports, speaking with constituents, conducting research, writing speeches and editing printed material. Interns will receive up to 15 hours of Truman State credit and a \$2,500 stipend. Applicants must have a cumulative GPA of 2.75, a minimum of two semesters of residence at Truman and 60 semester hours of credit, and approval from their division.

2 years ago

Parking decals double in price 2010

Truman State Parking Services increased the price of year-long resident (green) and commuter (blue) decals from \$50 to \$100. Parking fines also were increased from \$25 to \$50. The increases resulted in 600 less parking permits being sold during the fall semester.

21 Years ago

Co-ed housing approved by Board 1991

The Board of Governors approved a policy giving the University president the authority to implement co-educational housing on campus. The decision was passed with a vote of 5 to 1 and ended an 18 year struggle with Student Senate about the issue.

24 years ago

New cell biology lab added to biology department 1988

The University, in conjunction with the National Science Foundation, purchased a cell biology lab for \$125,000. Professors Gary Sells and Austin Jay submitted the proposal stating the lab was a necessity in keeping the University current with science. Before the lab was purchased, cell biology was the only science course offered only as a lecture, without any lab work.
