Former military adviser discusses drones

Lawrence Wilkerson, government professor at William & Mary College in Virginia, spoke at Truman State April 10 about the dangers of unmanned army drones.

Wilkerson was a former adviser and chief of staff under former Secretary of State Colin Powell during George W. Bush's presidency. He is a 31-year army veteran.

Wilkerson was on campus as part of an event sponsored by the School of Social and Cultural Studies, the Cultural and Societal Honor Society, the Multicultural Affairs Center and the Department of History.

Business major found dead, fraternity brothers mourn loss

1984

Former student Stanley McClanahan was found dead in his apartment on the 700 block of S. First St. Sunday, April 8, 1984. Investigating detective Randall Forquer of the Kirksville Police Department said the cause of death was determined to be a self-inflicted gunshot wound from a 12-gauge shotgun. The death was treated as a suicide. McClanahan was a member of Phi Kappa Theta and served on its pledge committee.

Activity fee raised to bring better entertainers

2000

The student activity fee increased to \$16 per semester starting during 2000. Students voted for a \$7 increase during Spring 1999. The increase nearly doubled the Student Activity Board's annual budget, raising it to about \$144,000 per year. SAB debated bringing bands such as Counting Crows, Dave Matthews Band and the Red Hot Chili Peppers with the increase in funding. The SAB split the money from the fee increase with the Funds Allotment Council.
