Students in the Noyce Scholars Program must pursue undergraduate degrees in mathematics and physics and a Master's degree in education. In exchange, participants can receive as much as \$20,000 in scholarships per year and receive specialized advising services.

McClain suspends coach for fundraising activities

1984

Former University President Charles McClain suspended former assistant football coach Fred Haeger pending an investigation into his alleged organizing of a fundraising party held at the Tau Kappa Epsilon barn. Former football player Frank Lolli said the party had an entry charge that was donated to the football team. At the time, several students were facing minor in possession and felony selling liquor without a license charges in connection to the party. Former athletic director Kenneth Gardner said the suspension was delayed several weeks from the time of the incident.

### 3 years ago

Mills, Edge win City Council election

2011

City Councilmen Jerry Mills and Roger Edge won their first terms on the Council April 5, 2011. Edge received 28.22 percent of vote and Mills won 31.89 percent, which was enough to defeat former candidates Eddy Williams and Betty McLane-Iles. Both candidates said they planned to encourage business growth in Kirksville during their time on the Council. McLane-Iles, who currently is a French professor at Truman State, said she wished Mills and Edge well during their time in office.
