Adair County man found dead underneath tractor

An Adair County man died after his tractor rolled over on top of him Nov. 26.

Richard Dale Johnson, 46, was discovered on his property at the 22800 block of Buck Creek Road pinned underneath his overturned tractor. He was pronounced dead at the scene.

Local woman OK after being attacked with knife

A 31-year-old Kirksville woman was released from Northeast Regional Medical Center after being treated for knife wounds sustained while her house was being burglarized.

Kirksville police responded to a call Nov. 21 at the 800 block of Kings Rd. The woman was found in her home with multiple knife wounds, which were not life-threatening. Police currently are investigating the burglary.

Truman signs partnership with Chinese foreign language group

University Provost Joan Poor and Truman Institute Director Kevin Minch traveled to Beijing Nov. 2 to sign a partnership with the Foreign Language Teaching and Research Press.

Truman will offer two different programs through the FLTRP. The first is a tour across the United States that features a week-long language course on the Truman State campus. The second is a language academy that will operate jointly with Joseph Baldwin Academy. The operation will offer a Chinese language and culture course to American students and an English language and culture course to visiting Chinese students.

FLTRP is the largest foreign language publisher in China and partners with universities throughout the world to teach Chinese to non-Chinese students and to give Chinese students the chance to learn foreign languages.

Sober drivers receive free soda

Truman State students working with Creatively Helping to Establish an Educated and Responsible Society began to petition local bars and restaurants to give designated drivers free non-alcoholic drinks. CHEERS is a state-wide program that encourages Missourians to designate a driver when they consume alcohol and had 300 businesses state-wide working with them at the time of print. The local push to recruit businesses to CHEERS was led by students in Lifetime Health and Fitness classes, who gave water bottles and pamphlets to students and petitioned businesses that serve alcohol. Roberta Donahue, Truman faculty CHEERS coordinator, said students used designated drivers, but not in a consistent manner.

33 years ago

Anonymous report leads to student arrest
1980

Kirksville police arrested former Truman State student Roger Stottle Nov. 14, 1980 for possession of stolen goods and narcotics. The police received an anonymous tip saying a handgun was in Stottle's room in Missouri Hall. After receiving permission to enter Stottle's room, they found stolen liquor, car batteries and marijuana but did not find a gun. They also found two knives on Stottle's person. Olin Johnson, former director of Campus Safety and Security, said there was about \$81 of stolen goods recovered from the room. Stottle's charges were still being determined at the time of print.
