Kirksville man charged with meth production

A Kirksville citizen has been charged with three felonies for allegedly producing methamphetamine in his home.

Joshua Wayne Craig, 32, was charged with possession and manufacture of methamphetamine as well as procuring materials with the intent of producing a controlled substance.

Kirksville police and Adair County sheriffs also found power tools, camping equipment, an ATV, a shotgun and an AR-15 rifle in the residence. These items allegedly have been stolen from Adair County residents during the past few months. The Adair County Sheriff Department will post images of these goods to their Facebook page to allow citizens to claim their stolen property.

Craig is being held in the Adair County Jail on \$75,000 cash-only bond.

Kirksville man arrested for sexually abusing disabled person

A Kirksville citizen has been charged with sexual abuse after allegedly attempting to touch a physically and mentally disabled person.

Chad Kelsall, 40, was charged Jan. 31 with felony sexual assault after Kirksville police arrested him near the Chariton Valley Association Jan. 31. Police allege they found a used condom near the resident, who is unable to move or speak. Kelsall reportedly confessed to fondling himself while touching the victim.

Kelsall is being held in the Adair County Jail on \$10,000 cash-only bond.
