Former State Rep. suffers cyber attack

Former State Rep. Rebecca McClanahan was the target of an online attack attempting to steal personal information.

Kirksville Police Chief Jim Hughes said the attack was reported last Friday. He said somebody attempted to steal information from McClanahan's computer, presumably to access bank accounts. He said the attack was unsuccessful and the department is investigating the incident.

McClanahan served as state representative for Missouri's second district between 2007 and 2011. She attempted to reclaim the seat during 2012, but was defeated by State Rep. Nate Walker.

Truman hosts appeals court

Truman State welcomed three state judges as they listened to oral arguments for conviction appeals.

Chief Judge James Welsh, Western District Judge Joseph Ellis and Mary Russell, Missouri Supreme Court Chief Justice and Truman alumna, heard appeals from lawyers on four cases. It was the eighth time the Western District Appellate Court convened at Truman.

Student faces charges of forgery

1991

Former student Dan Winograd was charged with possession of forgery equipment inside his residence hall room Feb. 27, 1991. Kirksville police discovered a Polaroid camera, a 22 by 30 inch sheet of red background paper and adhesive numbers and letters. They also discovered three fake Kentucky driver's licenses, two fake Kansas driver's licenses and 10 photos of potential clients Winograd took. Winograd was released 20 hours after he was arrested. David Lukefahr, former KPD field operations commander, said forging licenses is a class C felony punishable by two to seven years in a state correctional facility or one year in a county jail and up to a \$5,000 fine.

Crash injures CCF volunteers

2006

Thirteen former members of Truman State's Campus Christian Fellowship were taken to hospitals in Oklahoma City after an oncoming vehicle struck their van March 18, 2006. Alumny Mark Hager said Oklahoma resident Jeanetta Fountain was driving her vehicle the wrong way on Interstate Route 35 and struck the third of the seven-vehicle CCF caravan about 5:19 a.m., causing the vehicle to roll over. The fifth van in the CCF group struck the overturned vehicle, Hoger said. Ten of the passengers were released after being treated for minor injuries, but former CCF pastor Joe Belzer and alumni John Hainline and Rebecca Hanania stayed in various Oklahoma City hospitals because they were in serious condition. Lt. Pete Norwood, spokesman for the Oklahoma Highway Patrol, said Fountain's car smelled like alcohol when troopers were investigating the scene.
