### Kirkville woman struck by own vehicle

Kirkville resident Lisa Stanek, 40, was transported to Northeast Regional Medical Center around 6 a.m. Nov. 9 after being struck by her own vehicle.

According to the crash report from the Missouri State Highway Patrol, Stanek was parked on the side of Highway 11 and was standing behind her car when the vehicle began to roll backward. The rear of the vehicle ran over Stanek and eventually was stopped when it hit a tree.

Stanek's condition was not made available by NRMCA representatives.

### Kirkville resident sentenced to 12 years after fifth DWI

A Lewis County court sentenced Kirkville resident James E. Steele, 37, to 12 years in prison Nov. 6.

A Lewis County jury found Steele guilty of driving while intoxicated Sept. 23. He will serve his sentence, along with another seven years for an unrelated DWI charge, at a Missouri Department of Corrections facility.

### Local teacher wins \$100,000 in state lottery

Kirkville R-III teacher Tracy Ockenfels, 46, won \$100,000 from the Missouri Lottery late last month.

Ockenfels bought the scratch ticket from Casey's General Store last month. She later claimed her prize in Jefferson City. She told lottery officials getting through the work day while having the winning ticket was the most difficult thing she's ever done.

### 27 years ago

#### Students form human rights club

1986

Thirty students convened Nov. 5, 1986 to form Truman State's chapter of Amnesty International. The focus of the group is to educate students about world issues through debates, demonstrations and guest lecturers. The group also encouraged those with differing political beliefs to join and debate in a safe environment. The first faculty advisors for the group were former academic advisor Annette Jacobs and former business professor Jim Keefe.

### 11 years ago

#### First floor of SUB floods

1995

An overloaded electrical panel sparked a small house fire to a student home Nov. 8, 1995. Five students lived in the house and were unharmed, but did have to seek temporary housing while the Kirkville Fire Department investigated. KFD Lt. Claude Filkins said an overloaded electrical panel caused the fire. At the time of the fire, the fuse box was not up to code, which technically made the house legally inhabitable.
