Kirkville R-III superintendent to retire after academic year

Kirkville R-III superintendent Patrick Williams will retire from the school district effective June 30, 2014.

Williams, who has spent 31 years working within the district as a teacher and an administrator, announced his resignation to the Kirkville R-III school board during a closed session Nov. 13. Kirkville R-III is preparing to begin searching for a new superintendent and hopes to name a replacement next February.

County employees receive raise

The Adair County Commission approved 2 percent cost-of-living adjustment for all county employees and elected officials Nov. 13.

The COLA increase will cost the county an extra \$56,400 in wages and benefits, most of which will be paid for by Adair County's sales tax.

34 years ago

Students implicated in telephone fraud
1979

Forty-five former Northeast Missouri State University students allegedly used a fraudulent telephone credit card number to place long-distance calls, Kenneth Reiser, an investigator for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, said he traveled to campus and interviewed possible suspects after the telephone company saw an unusual amount of activity from Ryle Hall and Centennial Hall totaling as much as \$3,000 in fraudulent charges. He said every student that used the card could be prosecuted for fraud and conspiracy, but was not pressing any charges at the time of print.

24 years ago

Football coach resigns
1989

Jack Ball, former Northeast Missouri State University football head coach, resigned after seven years of leading the Bulldogs. Ball said he was leaving for personal reasons. He finished his career at the helm of NMSU's football program with a 36-39 record overall. Former Athletic Director John Cochrane said he accepted Ball's resignation and said it did not have anything to do with allegations that the NCAA was preparing to audit the football program.
