### Kirkville man accused of sexual assault, burglary

Kirkville police arrested Kirkville resident Earl Turner, 45, for felony burglary and attempted rape Oct. 30 at the 400 block of N. Elson St.

According to the probable cause statement, Turner entered the residence asking to use a phone after his vehicle broke down and later attempted to rape the resident.

Turner is being held in the Adair County Jail on a \$100,000 bond.

### Kirkville to plant new trees thanks to multiple grants

The city of Kirkville will plant more than 80 new trees in its parks and cemeteries because of two grants.

Forest ReLeaf of Missouri, a non-profit organization that helps communities reforest their towns, will give Kirkville 45 trees to be planted in parks throughout town.

The Missouri Department of Conservation will donate 36 trees to be planted in the Forest-Llewellyn Cemetery.

The trees are scheduled to be planted during mid-November.

### Kirkville R-III installs swings for disabled students

The Kirkville R-III school district added swings designed for disabled students to use Oct. 29 at Kirkville Primary School and Ray Miller Elementary School.

The Missouri Inclusion Project, a parent organization that aims to make schools throughout northeast Missouri as inclusive as possible to all students, donated the swings. The swings were placed next to regular swings to encourage inclusive play during recess.

### 39 years ago

#### Funding approved to build McClain Hall

1974

Truman State approved \$3 million for the construction of the administration and classroom building, which was later renamed McClain Hall. Former Dean of Administration Ray E. Klinginsmith said construction would last two years and was scheduled to be completed during fall 1979. At the time, the outside of the building had been designed and architects still were planning the interior. Klinginsmith said having McClain Hall and the recently redesigned Student Union Building would make the University campus appear more beautiful.

### 11 years ago

#### First floor of SUB flooded

2002

A broken ceiling pipe caused water to flood the first floor of the Student Union Building on Nov. 6, 2002. Brady Nelson, a former member of Campus Christian Fellowship, said he was leading a prayer group in the building when he heard a loud popping noise from the ceiling. Seconds later, a water pipe burst into the room and began spraying students and the room with water. SUB building manager Jerry Findling said the water pipe burst around 6:50 p.m. and filled the entire first floor from staircase to staircase before water was turned off throughout the building. The clean-up and repair was completed within hours.
