### Kirksville R-III to spend thousands for professional development

The Kirksville R-III school district is planning to spend \$66,000 on teacher and faculty development after withholding funds in that area for years.

The district will add \$6,000 for conference travel costs and \$60,000 to be used for data-focused professional development to this year's budget. The overall budget will be about \$26,750,000.

The state formerly required school districts to invest part of their budget in faculty development every year, but have given districts waivers the past three years to accommodate budgets weakened by a weak economy. The state began to enforce the policy again because local economies are beginning to recover from the 2008 economic crisis.

### Construction to begin at Thousand Hills

Supporters of the Forest Lake Area Trail System will celebrate the beginning of construction on a trail connecting Thousand Hills State Park to Kirksville's downtown area 4 p.m. today at the petroglyph site in the park.

Workers from the Missouri Department of Natural Resources arrived Sept. 9 to begin preliminary work on Phase I of the project, which would build a trail linking the Thousand Hills Dining Lodge with the petroglyph site in the park. Phase II and III, which would build a trail connecting the park to Kirksville, are expected to begin at a later date.

### Man arrested at Wal-Mart

Kirksville police arrested Kirksville resident Santonio Parker, 35, with felony burglary at the Wal-Mart after responding to a trespassing call.

Police found several DVDs and clothing items hidden in his jacket as he attempted to leave the store. Parker previously was banned from entering the store after an earlier dispute. He is being held in the Adair County Jail on \$50,000 bond.

### Truman receives STEM grants

The University received a \$1.2 million grant to aid students interested in becoming high school science and mathematics teachers.

The grant comes from the Robert Noyce Teacher Scholarship Program, which is run by the National Science Foundation. Truman expects to train and certify 20 students to teachers in the next five years with the grant.

### 31 years ago

20 Marijuana plants seized

1982

The Adair County Sheriff's Department seized 20 marijuana plants Sept. 17, 1982 from a field outside Kirksville. The tip originally was sent to the Kirksville Police Department, which set up a sting operation with the Sheriff's Department. Former Adair County Sheriff Jim Kemp said the plants appeared to have started life in a greenhouse and were then moved to the field. The plants immediately were destroyed after the operation. No arrests were made at the time of print. Kemp estimated the plants were worth \$5,000 at the time, which would be about \$12,000 today.

### 8 years ago

Former councilman placed in protective custody

2005

Former Kirksville City Councilman Richard Scott was placed in protective custody Oct. 2, 2005 behind Kirksville police found him stumbling in the streets. Police first made contact with Scott after TP's Office, a bar on Elson St., attempting to urinate. Scott complied when officers told him to use the restroom inside. Officers later stopped Scott as he entered his vehicle and placed him in protective custody for the night. Scott was indicted by a grand jury for driving while intoxicated earlier that year.
