During that year, the University completed building the current Student Union Building and additions to Pickler Memorial Library, Magruder Hall and Pershing Building. When it was completed, the Student Union housed an eight-lane bowling alley, a 16-table billiards room and a small barbershop. The addition to Pickler Memorial tripled the student capacity of the building. The Pershing Building extension currently houses the nursing department.
