Jimmy John's employee charged with vandalism

Philip A. Young, 22, was charged last week with three felony counts of property damage and a felony count of tampering with evidence.

Kirksville Police said Young climbed to the roof of the Jimmy John's building during early September and damaged air vents, walls, doors and signage after using his key to enter the building. Police also allege he deleted security camera footage the following day.

Young is being held in the Adair County Jail on \$10,000 bond.

Kirksville man convicted of fifth DWI

Kirksville resident James E. Steele, 37, was found guilty of driving under the influence Sept. 20.

Steele has been convicted of driving under the influence four times prior to Sept. 20, the most recent being Sept. 1, 2012.

Steele also was convicted for two other felony offenses and faces 10 years to life in prison. His sentencing hearing is Nov. 6. He will remain in custody until then.

However, the University began publicly advertising the program to students during 1980.

Party becomes violent, University students involved

A confrontation between Kirksville residents and students caused police to be dispatched to an off-campus home. Anonymous sources said three Kirksville residents entered the party held at the 700 block of N. Franklin St. and attempted to steal beer from a keg. This started a violent altercation between students and the residents. The Kirksville residents left the party but later returned and threatened a student with a shotgun. Kirksville Police arrived at the scene at 1 a.m. and arrested two of the townspeople. Charges were not published at the time of press.
