"The tournament was tough," Brak said. "We knew we could win that match against Rockhurst but it just didn't work out. They are a great team, hats off to them."

After the tournament, the American Volleyball Coaches Association announced the All-Midwest region team, with four Truman State players on the squad. Having four players selected was the highest for the team during a single season since 2008 and is the most from any Midwest school. Patterson received all-region honors along with all three of her senior teammates — Meghan Zimmerman, Moser and Brak.

This is the second season in a row Patterson and Brak earned all-region recognition. Last year, both also received All-American honors from the American Volleyball Coaches Association. The majority of the all-region team are members of the GLVC, with 10 of the 14 spots on the region's primary team. The GLVC was represented in the region by earning awards such as Freshman of the Year from McKendree and Coach of the Year from Rockhurst.

"This season was such a ride — I couldn't have asked for anything more for a senior season," Brak said. "There's nothing like winning a [conference] championship with your teammates."


The Bulldogs finish the 2014 season with an overall record of 29-4 and a GLVC conference title. They received top seeds in the conference and national tournament, along with a number of individual and team awards that deserved attention from across the country. Truman's three graduating seniors — Moser, Brak and Zimmerman — will leave their names behind in nearly 10 program records collectively.

Bastian said much of this year's success is because of the seniors, but everyone held up their end of the bargain.

"Every person on the team has worked extremely hard since the first day of spring season last year, throughout the summer and every day of practice in season," Bastian said. "Our seniors led the way and a huge reason we were successful this season."

Four starters and nine lettermen will return next August for the 2015 season. Next year's team has a lot to look forward to because of the success of this year's group, Walters said.

"One of the things we said in the locker room was 'tomorrow starts day one,'" Walters said. "The returning players are going to use the success of this past season to motivate them to put in work during offseason in preparation of next fall."
