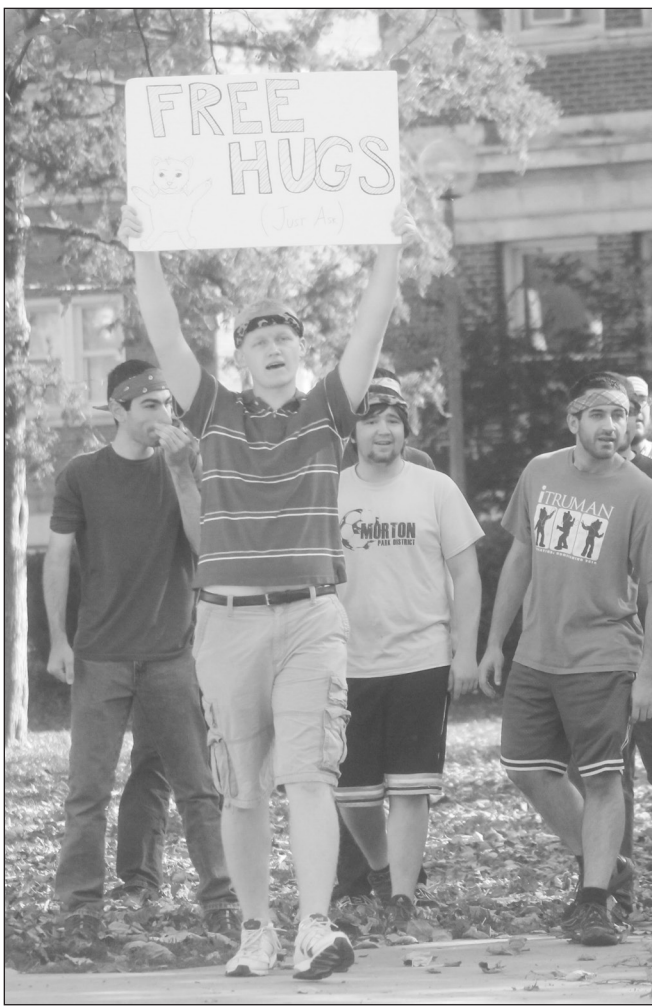


Truman students play Humans vs. Zombies

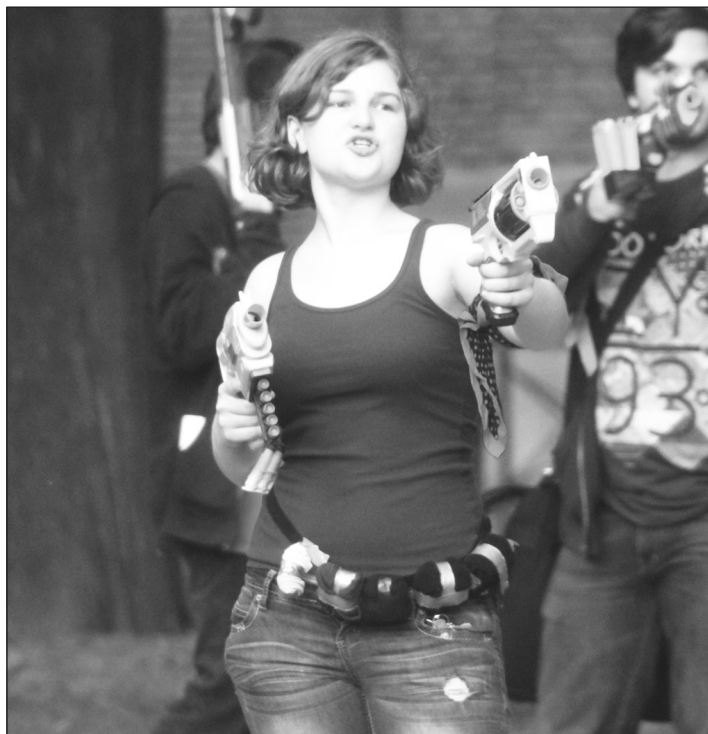

NEWS IN BRIEF

Overnight fire extinguished at Cenveo building last week

The Kirksville Fire Department responded to a fire alarm at 9:05 p.m. Oct. 25 at 3010 Industrial Road in Kirksville, according to a press release from the City of Kirksville.

According to the press release, Cenveo Inc., a manufacturing plant, is located at the Industrial Road address. The Kirksville Police Department and Adair County Ambulance District also responded to the scene of the fire, along with the Kirksville Public Works Department and Adair County Rural Fire Department.

According to the press release, the fire was contained and reported under control by 9:54 p.m. The fire caused no significant structural damage and the plant was not operating at the time of the fire, so no one was injured in the incident.

The investigation still is ongoing, and is led by the Kirksville Police Department's Fire Investigator and the Missouri Division of Fire Safety from the State Fire Marshal's Office. No further information will be released until the investigation is complete.
